OVERVIEW

The Education Endowment Scheme, commonly known as the Edusave Scheme, was established in January 1993. Its objective is to maximise and equalise educational opportunities for all Singaporeans. It aims to enhance the quality of education in Singapore and to motivate pupils to excel academically.

The Edusave Scheme is governed by the Education Endowment Scheme Act (CAP 87A). The Edusave Endowment Fund and Edusave Pupils Fund were established under the Act.

The Edusave Advisory Council was also set up under the Act for the purpose of advising the Minister for Education on the application of the income from the Edusave Endowment Fund. The second Edusave Advisory Council completed its two-year term on 31 December 1996. The third Edusave Advisory Council, consisting of five members from the business and education sectors, was appointed on 1 January 1997 for a two-year period.

The Edusave Endowment Fund received a Government contribution of \$0.5 billion from the Consolidated Revenue Account during the financial year (FY 96). The Fund is invested by the Government and is deemed to earn a fixed income pegged to the CPF interest rate. The balance in the Capital Account of the Endowment Fund as at 31 March 1997 was \$4.5 billion. The Government's target is to build up the capital sum to \$5.0 billion.

During the financial year, the Edusave Endowment Fund generated an interest income of \$160.03m. With the balance brought forward of \$94.92m, the total income available in the Income Account for FY 96 amounted to \$254.95m.

Of this amount, \$121.22m was disbursed during the period in the form of contributions to pupils' Edusave accounts, Edusave scholarships, Edusave grants, Edusave merit bursaries, Constituency Top-up bursaries and development and operating expenditures, and \$60.58m was committed for disbursement in 1997. The balance of \$73.15m was set aside for allocation in 1998.

The Edusave Pupils Fund comprises funds which are credited to the Edusave accounts of eligible pupils in primary and secondary schools and trainees in the Institute of Technical Education. In 1996, contributions are also made to Edusave accounts of eligible pupils in SPED schools. The contribution rate was \$160 in 1997 and \$130 in 1996. The total contributions disbursed in the financial year was \$63.53m. During the financial year, a total of \$14.98m was withdrawn for payment of 2nd-tier miscellaneous fees, school-based enrichment programmes and payment of tuition fees at the polytechnics and universities. This is almost double that of the \$7.18m withdrawn in the previous financial year. In the primary, secondary and Pre-U levels, 168,710 pupils out of 430,700 made withdrawals from their Edusave accounts, representing a pupil participation rate of 39.2%, compared to 33.4% in the previous financial year.

In addition to the Edusave funds in the pupils' accounts, Edusave grants were also allocated to all Government and Government-aided primary and secondary schools during the year to enable them to procure services and resources and introduce programmes that enhance the quality of teaching and learning. In 1996, SPED schools were also given Edusave grants pegged at \$50 per pupil. Edusave grants are further extended to independent schools, junior colleges/centralised institutes (JCs/CIs) and Institutes of Technical Education (ITE) at \$90, \$120, and \$100 per pupil respectively in 1997. Of the allocation of \$30.58m for the financial year, \$24.21m was spent, representing a utilisation rate of 79.2%.

The total value of Edusave scholarships awarded to pupils in primary, independent schools and Government and Government-aided secondary schools during the financial year was \$12.92m.

Under the Edusave Entrance Scholarships for Independent Schools (EESIS) Scheme, scholarships are awarded to the top 25% of pupils enrolled in independent schools based on PSLE results. The scholarship is tenable for four years of education in the independent school. Its value is equivalent to the school fees of each independent school less the school and standard miscellaneous fees in the Government and Government-aided secondary schools. In January 1997, 836 scholarships were awarded to secondary one pupils. Of these 655 were funded from Edusave funds and the remaining 181 from Voted Funds under the special programmes, ie Gifted Education Programme, Music Elective Programme and Art Elective Programme. In addition, 143 secondary one to four pupils were also awarded the Edusave (Independent Schools) Yearly Award in December 1996. This is given to the top 5% of pupils in each independent school based on the school examination results, and who are not EESIS holders. The total value of scholarships paid to independent school pupils from Edusave funds was \$4.32m.

For pupils in the Government and Government-aided secondary schools, 15,872 scholarships were awarded to secondary one to five pupils in December 1996 under the Edusave Scholarships for Secondary Schools (ESSS) Scheme. Under the Scheme, the top 5% of pupils at each level based on the school examination results received \$500 each while the next 5% received \$300 each. These scholarships amounted to \$6.40m.

From 1996, scholarships are also awarded to the top 10% of pupils in primary 5 and 6 under the Edusave Scholarship for Primary School (ESPS) Scheme. Under the scheme, the top 5% of pupils in primary 5 and 6 received \$300 each while the next 5% of pupils received \$250 each. These scholarships amounted to \$2.19m.

Edusave Merit Bursaries (EMB) Scheme was introduced in 1995 to motivate pupils from the lower-middle and lower income families to do better in schools. Singaporean pupils in all primary and secondary schools who are within the top 25% of each level and stream and whose gross monthly household income is below \$3000 are eligible to apply for the bursary. The value of the EMB is \$150 for primary 1 to 3, \$200 for primary 4 to 6 and \$250 for secondary 1 to 5. Pupils who have been awarded Edusave Scholarships are not eligible for the EMB.

In 1996, EMB was extended to students in JCs/CIs and ITE to give bright students from lower-middle and lower income families an incentive to perform well. The value of the EMB is \$300 for JCs/CIs and \$400 for ITE. Pupils who received MOE scholarships (Humanities, Pre-U or Language Elective Scholarships) are not eligible for the EMB.

In 1996, a total of 51,366 pupils were awarded the bursaries, representing 10.6% of total enrolment in primary and secondary schools, JCs/CIs and ITE. A sum of \$10.80m was disbursed by the People's Association for these awards.

In addition, Government has also pledged a dollar-for-dollar matching grant for constituency bursaries paid to pupils in schools and trainees in ITE in 1995 under the Constituency Top-up Bursary Scheme. The Constituency Top-up Bursary Scheme provides for a top-up from the Edusave Endowment Fund in the ratio of 1:1 to each Citizens' Consultative Committee (CCCs) subject to a cap of 10% of the total value of the EMB awarded in the previous year. A sum of \$0.48m was disbursed in FY96.

The development and operating cost of the Edusave Endowment Fund and Edusave Pupils Fund amounted to \$1.49m during the financial year.

As at 31 March 1997, the balance in the Edusave Endowment Fund was \$4.63 billion, including a balance of \$133.73m in the Income Account. Of this amount, \$60.58m was committed for disbursements in 1997, leaving a balance of \$73.15m for allocation in 1998.

EDUSAVE ENDOWMENT FUND

TRANSFERS FROM CONSOLIDATED REVENUE ACCOUNT

The Edusave Endowment Fund was created on 1 January 1993 by the transfer of funds from the Consolidated Revenue Account. The Government contributed an additional \$0.5 billion in FY 96 bringing the capital sum of the Fund to \$4.5 billion as at 31 March 1997. The Government's target is to build up the capital sum to \$5.0 billion.

INCOME FROM THE EDUSAVE ENDOWMENT FUND

The Edusave Endowment Fund is invested by the Government and earns a fixed interest income pegged to the CPF rate of interest. The interest earned each year is used to finance the outlay under the Edusave Scheme. The interest rate was 3.52% pa from 1 April 1996 to 30 June 1996, 3.48% pa from 1 July 1996 to 31 March 1997.

During the period under review, the Edusave Endowment Fund generated an interest income of \$160.03m. With the income brought forward of \$94.92m, the total income available was \$254.95m.


ALLOCATION OF INCOME

Of the total income of \$254.95m, \$121.22m was disbursed during the financial year as shown in the chart on the next page. Of the balance of \$133.73m, \$60.58m was committed for disbursement in 1997 leaving \$73.15m which was set aside for use in 1998.

BALANCE AS AT 31 MARCH 1997

As at 31 March 1997, the balance in the Edusave Endowment Fund was \$4.63 billion, comprising \$4.5 billion in the Capital Account and \$133.73 m in the Income Account.

EDUSAVE PUPILS FUND

CONTRIBUTIONS IN 1997

The Edusave Pupils Fund comprises Edusave funds which are paid into the Edusave accounts of eligible pupils. The contribution rates for 1996 and 1997 are \$130 and \$160 respectively. In 1996, the Edusave Scheme is extended to disabled pupils in Government-supported special education schools. During the financial year, \$63.44m was paid into the accounts of 417,900 pupils in primary, SPED and secondary schools, and \$0.09m was paid into the accounts of 700 pupils in the Institute of Technical Education. The total contribution in FY 96 amounted to \$63.53m.

APPROVED USES

A pupil can use the money in his Edusave account to pay for enrichment programmes organised by his school such as extra-curricular activities, music and dance, educational tours, sports and games lessons etc. He can also use the money to pay his 2nd-tier miscellaneous fees if he is in a Government or Government-aided school. In the case of independent schools, the money can be used to pay the portion of school fees in excess of the dollar value of the school and standard miscellaneous fees of a Government or Government-aided secondary school. Pupils in autonomous schools can also use the fund to pay the autonomous school additional miscellaneous fees.

Polytechnic students can withdraw the accumulated balance in their Edusave funds to pay their polytechnic tuition fees. From academic year 1996/97, university students who have accumulated Edusave funds have been able to use the money to pay their university tuition fees.

ANALYSIS OF WITHDRAWALS

A total of \$14.98m was withdrawn from the Edusave accounts in FY 96. The bulk of the withdrawals amounting to \$14.36m were made by 168,710 pupils in primary, secondary schools and junior colleges/ centralised institutes. This represented a pupil participation rate of 39.2% and a fund utilisation rate of 22.9%, an increase compared to rates of 33.4% and 14.1% respectively in the previous financial year. Trainees in the Institute of Technical Education (ITE) withdrew a small sum of \$2,600 while polytechnic and university students withdrew \$0.61m for payment of tuition fees.

Of the \$14.36m withdrawn by pupils in school, \$1.15m (8.0%) was for payment of 2nd-tier miscellaneous fees, and the remaining \$13.21m (92.0%) was for enrichment programmes. Please see Table 1.

Note: Students in JC/CI do not receive Edusave contributions. Hence the amount withdrawn is from the accumulated balance in their Edusave accounts brought forward from secondary schools. The total utilisation rate of 22.8% represents the utilisation rate of primary and secondary schools, excluding those withdrawn by students in JCs/CIs.

Of the \$13.21m withdrawn for enrichment programmes, \$1.59m (12.1%) was spent on personal development programmes, \$2.33m (17.6%) on educational tours and camps, \$8.49m (64.3%) on academic enrichment programmes, \$0.49m (3.7%) on sports and games, and \$0.30m (2.3%) on aesthetic activities. Details are in Table 2.

The 168,710 pupils who made withdrawals during the financial year were spread over 360 schools, out of a total of 361 schools (99.7%). Only 1 primary school did not make use of Edusave funds for 2nd-tier miscellaneous fees and enrichment programmes. Please see Table 3.

ADMINISTRATION OF EDUSAVE PUPILS FUND

The Central Provident Fund Board (CPFB) is responsible for maintaining the accounts of the Edusave Pupils Fund. Based on information furnished by the Ministry, the Board opens an Edusave account for every eligible pupil. It credits Edusave contributions to the accounts, process withdrawals and remit funds withdrawn to the schools. Interest is credited to the accounts yearly based on CPF interest rate. The CPFB sends half-yearly statements of account in February to all Edusave account holders showing the contributions, interest credited, withdrawals during the preceding 6 months and the balance in the accounts. In August, statements of account are sent only to those with transactions in the preceding 6 months.

EDUSAVE GRANTS

AMOUNT ALLOCATED

Since the inception of Edusave Scheme in 1993, Edusave grants have been given to all Government and Government-aided secondary schools to enable them to procure services and resources and introduce programmes that enhance the quality of teaching and learning. The grant for secondary schools is pegged at \$90 per pupil. In January 1996, Edusave grants were extended to all primary schools pegged at the rate of \$50 per pupil. In July 1996, SPED schools were also given Edusave grants pegged at the rate of \$50 per pupil. In January 1997, the grants were further extended to independent schools, JCs/CIs and ITE pegged at the rate of \$90, \$120 and \$100 per pupil respectively.

The grant allocated for FY 96 was \$30.58m, comprising of \$13.59m for 196 primary schools, \$0.15m for 15 SPED schools, \$15.63m for 139 secondary schools for the whole financial year; and \$0.26m for 8 independent schools, \$0.67m for 18 JCs/CIs, and \$0.28m for 13 technical institutes for the period January 1997 to March 1997.

AMOUNT DISBURSED

The Edusave grants were disbursed to schools in two half-yearly instalments, in January and July each year. The total amount of Edusave grants disbursed to schools during the financial year was \$32.00m.

UTILISATION OF GRANTS

Of the allocation of \$30.58m for FY 96, the schools spent a total of \$24.21m, representing an overall utilisation rate of 79.2 %. The utilisation rate for secondary schools had increased from 88.2% in FY 95 to 95.4 % in FY 96. The utilisation rate for primary schools for FY 96 had also increased from 12.6% in FY 95 to 67.6% in FY 96 out of the amount allocated during each of the financial year.

The bulk of the expenditure of 18.69m (77.2%) was on enrichment programmes, while the remaining 5.52m (22.8%) was spent on resources and equipment. Table 4 shows a breakdown of the expenditure.

During the financial year, 127 (91.4%) secondary schools had spent more than 50% of their grant allocation, compared to 85.8% of secondary schools in the previous financial period. 142 (72.4%) primary schools had spent more than 50% of their grant allocation during this financial year compared to 10.2% of primary schools in the last quarter of the previous financial period.

During the financial year, only 1 (6.3%) SPED school spent more than 25% of the grant allocation. For independent schools, JCs/CIs, ITE, the percentage of Edusave grants spent ranged from 0% - 25% during the last quarter of FY 96. Only 2 (25%) independent schools have spent more than 50% of their grant allocation during the period.

EDUSAVE SCHOLARSHIPS FOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS

EDUSAVE ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIP FOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS (EESIS)

VALUE AND TENURE OF AWARD

Under the Edusave Entrance Scholarship for Independent Schools (EESIS) Scheme, scholarships are awarded to pupils in the top 25% of secondary one Singaporean pupils enrolled in the independent schools and who are not in any of the Ministry's special programmes. Selection is based on the pupils' PSLE results. The annual quantum of the scholarship is the school fees charged by the independent school (ranging from \$1,200 to a maximum of \$2,400 per year) less the amount of school and standard miscellaneous fees that pupils in Government and Government-aided secondary schools have to pay (\$144 per year). The value of each EESIS awarded therefore ranges from \$1,056 to \$2,256 per annum, depending on the school fees charged by each independent school. The scholarship is tenable for the full 4 years of the pupil's secondary education in the independent school.

EESIS FOR PUPILS IN SPECIAL PROGRAMMES

Under the Edusave Endowment Scheme (Edusave Scholarships) Regulations, the EESIS of pupils in the special programmes, ie the Gifted Education Programme, Music Elective Programme and Art Elective Programme, are funded from Voted Fund and not from Edusave Endowment Fund, because pupils in these special programmes are subsidised in their school fees from Voted Funds to the same value as the EESIS. This enables more pupils who are not in these special programmes to qualify for EESIS from Edusave Funds.

1997 EESIS AWARDS

In 1997, 836 scholarships were awarded to secondary one pupils, a decrease of 69 scholarships (-7.6%) over the 905 scholarships awarded in 1996. Of these, 655 scholarships, amounting to \$1.00m were funded from Edusave funds while the remaining 181 were funded from Voted Funds. During the financial year, another \$3.10m was disbursed from Edusave Funds to 2,024 scholars in secondary 2-4.

EDUSAVE (INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS) YEARLY AWARD

In addition to the EESIS, pupils in independent schools may also be awarded the Edusave (Independent Schools) Yearly Award if they are among the top 5% pupils in each independent school and are not already EESIS holders. The Yearly Awards are meant to reward pupils who were not selected for the 4-year EESIS award for excellent academic performance achieved in the year.

Selection for the Yearly Awards is based on the pupils' school examination results for that year. The value of the Yearly Award is equivalent to the annual value of the EESIS.

1996 YEARLY AWARDS

In December 1996, 143 secondary one to four pupils in the independent schools were given the Yearly Awards, amounting to \$0.22m.

EDUSAVE SCHOLARSHIPS FOR GOVERNMENT AND GOVERNMENT-AIDED PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS

Singaporean pupils in the top 10% of each level in the Government and Government-aided secondary schools are eligible for Edusave Scholarships under the Edusave Scholarships for Secondary Schools (ESSS) Scheme. Pupils in the top 5% are awarded \$500 each while those in the next 5% receive \$300 each.

In 1996, Edusave Scholarships were extended to pupils in all Government and Government-aided primary schools to provide an incentive for the upper primary pupils to excel in their studies. Singaporean pupils in the top 10% at primary 5 and 6 levels in the Government and Government-aided primary schools are eligible for Edusave Scholarships under the Edusave Scholarships for Primary Schools (ESPS) Scheme. Pupils in the top 5% are awarded \$300 each while those in the next 5% receive \$250 each.

For both schemes, School Principals are given the flexibility to select awardees from any stream (Normal/ Express/ Special) in each level. Selection is based on the annual academic performance.

1996 ESSS AWARDS

A total of 15,872 pupils in secondary one to secondary five were awarded the ESSS. Out of the total number of awardees, 7,974 received the \$500 award and 7,898 pupils, the \$300 award. The total amount disbursed was \$6.36m.

The breakdown of the awards by stream shows that 6,827 (43.0%) awardees were from the Normal Stream, 8,061 (50.8%) from the Express Stream and 984 (6.2%) from the Special Stream. On the whole, 8.6% of pupils in secondary schools were awarded the ESSS. This is slightly below the target of 10% because non-Singaporean pupils in the top 10% are not eligible for the scholarship. Please see Table 6.

1996 ESPS AWARDS

A total of 7,925 pupils in primary 5 and 6 were awarded the ESPS. Out of the total number of awardees, 4,064 received the \$300 award and 3,861 pupils, the \$250 award. The total amount paid out was \$2.18m.

The breakdown of the awards by stream shows that 1,505 (10.5%) awardees were from the EM1, 5,379 (9.0%) from the EM2 and 1,041 (9.5%) from the EM3. On the whole, 9.3% of primary five and six pupils in primary schools were awarded the ESPS. This is slightly below the target of 10% because non-Singaporean pupils in the top 10% are not eligible for the scholarship. Please see Table 7.

EDUSAVE MERIT BURSARIES

The Edusave Merit Bursaries (EMB) Scheme was introduced in 1995 to help lower-middle and lower income Singaporeans level up by motivating their children to do better in schools. Singaporean pupils in all primary, and secondary schools who are in the top 25% within each level and stream, and whose gross monthly household income is less than \$3,000, are eligible for the EMB awards except those who are recipients of Edusave Scholarships.

The value of the yearly award is \$150 for Primary 1 to 3, \$200 for Primary 4 to 6 and \$250 for Secondary 1 to 5.

In 1996, EMB was extended to students in JCs/CIs and ITE to give bright students from lower-middle and lower income families an incentive to perform well. The eligibility criteria is similar to that in primary and secondary schools. The value of the EMB is \$300 for the JCs/CIs and \$400 for ITE. Pupils who received MOE scholarships (Humanities, Pre-U or Language Elective Scholarships) are not eligible for the EMB.

1996 EMB AWARDS

Based on 1996 year-end school examination results, 54,730 (21.8%) of Singaporean pupils in primary schools, 25,722 (14.0%) of those in secondary schools, 4,604 (21.1%) of those in JCs/CIs, and 1,881(22.2%) of those in ITE were invited to apply for the EMB awards. Of these pupils who are invited to apply, 29,714 (54.3%) of primary school pupils, 17,940 (69.7%) of secondary school pupils, 2,467 (53.6%) of pupils in JCs/CIs, and 1,245 (66.2%) of trainees in ITE were awarded the bursaries. The awardees constituted 11.0% of total enrolment in primary schools, 9.8% of those in secondary schools, 11.3% of those in JCs/CIs, and 14.7% of the trainees in ITE. The total amount disbursed during the year for 1996's EMB awards was \$10.80m. Details are shown in Table 8.

Constituency Top-up Bursaries

Government has pledged a dollar-for-dollar matching grant for constituency bursaries paid to pupils in schools and trainees in ITE in 1995 under the Constituency Top-up Bursary Scheme. The Constituency Top-up Bursary Scheme provides for a top-up from the Edusave Endowment Fund (EEF) in the ratio of 1:1 to each Citizens' Consultative Committee (CCCs) subject to a cap of 10% of the total value of the Edusave Merit Bursaries (EMB) awarded in the previous year. A sum of \$479,388 was disbursed through People's Association to the CCCs in FY 96.

From 1997, with the introduction of the Community Education Award Scheme (CEAS), the Constituency Top-up Bursary Scheme will be subsumed under it. The top-up from the EEF will be changed from 1:1 to 9:1 in the first year and 3:1 in subsequent years. The cap on the top up to each CCC will also be changed from 10% to 18% of the total value of the previous year's EMB awards in 1997. In subsequent years, the cap will be 15% of the total value of the previous year's EMB awards.

EDUSAVE ENDOWMENT FUND NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

1 PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Edusave Endowment Fund was established on 1 January 1993 under the Education Endowment Scheme Act (CAP 87A). The income generated by the Fund is to be used for the following purposes:

- (i) the provision of contributions to the Edusave Pupils Fund;
- (ii) the provision of scholarships to full-time pupils at prescribed schools;
- (iii) the provision of merit bursaries to full-time pupils in government, government-aided, independent schools, junior colleges/centralised institutes and Institute of Technical Education;
- (iv) the provision of grants to government, government-aided, independent and special education schools, junior colleges/centralised institutes and Institute of Technical Education to be used to enhance the quality of education; and
- (v) such other purposes authorised under the Act, including administrative expenses.

2 BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accounts are prepared on a cash basis. Income is recognised when received and expenses are recognised when paid.

3 ACCOUNTING YEAR

The accounting year is based on the Government financial year from 1 April 1996 to 31 March 1997 (FY96).

5 INCOME

The CPF interest rate is used to compute the interest income of the Fund. The rate was 3.52% pa from 1 April 1996 to 30 June 1996 and 3.48% pa from 1 July 1996 to 31 March 1997.

6 CONTRIBUTIONS TO EDUSAVE PUPILS FUND

The Edusave Pupils Fund consists of contributions made from the Edusave Endowment Fund to the Edusave accounts opened for eligible Singaporean pupils between the ages of six and sixteen, studying in prescribed schools. The rate of contribution to each account was \$130 in 1996 and \$160 in 1997. The total contributions disbursed in FY96 was \$63,591,300, and \$58,193 was recovered with interest from those who dropped out of schools, giving a net total contributions of \$63,533,107 in FY96.

7 ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES OF EDUSAVE PUPILS FUND

Charges by Central Provident Fund (CPF) Board for administering the Edusave Pupils Fund are paid out of the Edusave Endowment Fund in compliance with Section 17 of the Education Endowment Scheme Act (CAP 87A). An advance is paid to CPF Board to meet these administrative expenses. The balance of the advance brought forward from the previous financial year was \$349,282. An advance of \$1,144,468 was disbursed to CPF Board in FY 96. The expenses billed by CPF Board for FY 96 was \$865,741 as shown below, leaving a balance of \$628,009 in the advance account.

9 EDUSAVE MERIT BURSARIES

The Edusave Merit Bursaries Scheme was extended to junior colleges/ centralised institutes and Institute of Technical Education (ITE) in 1996. In FY96, a sum of \$11,278,788 (FY95: \$9,643,550) was disbursed to People's Association. This sum comprises \$10,799,400 (FY95: \$9,643,550) disbursed during the financial year for the payment of Edusave Merit Bursary (EMB) awards of 1995 and 1996, and \$479,388 (FY95: Nil) for the payment of Constituency Top-up Bursaries. For 1996's EMB awards, a sum of \$11,112,600 was disbursed to People's Association during the period January to December 96, out of which \$10,803,450 was disbursed to pupils and \$309,150 was refunded to the Ministry.

Primary schools were given a grant at the rate of \$50 per pupil and secondary schools were given a grant at the rate of \$90 per pupil in 1996 and 1997. Grants were given to special education (SPED) schools for the first time in July 1996, at the rate of \$50 per pupil. In January 1997, the grants were also given to independent schools, junior colleges/centralised institutes (JCs/CIs) and Institute of Technical Education (ITE), at the rate of \$90 per pupil for independent schools, \$120 per pupil for JCs/CIs, and \$100 per pupil for ITE.

EDUSAVE PUPILS FUND NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

1 PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Edusave Pupils Fund, managed by the Central Provident Fund (CPF) Board, receives contributions from the Edusave Endowment Fund which are credited to the Edusave accounts of eligible Singaporean pupils. The money can be withdrawn for use on enrichment programmes organised by schools, and payment of 2nd-tier miscellaneous fees, tertiary tuition fees and other approved fees.

2 BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accounts are prepared on a cash basis. Income is recognised when received and expenses are recognised when paid.

3 ACCOUNTING YEAR

The accounting year is based on the Government financial year from 1 April 1996 to 31 March 1997 (FY96).

4 INTEREST CREDITED TO MEMBERS' ACCOUNTS

Interest credited to members' accounts was based on the CPF interest rate of 3.52% pa from 1 April 1996 to 30 June 1996 and 3.48% pa from 1 July 1996 to 31 March 1997.
