EXISTING MTLLPC FLAGSHIP PROGRAMMES FROM 2016-2020

- CPCLL has tapped on a network of renowned local writers, representatives from community and media organisations such as the Singapore Federation of Chinese Cultural Associations, Singapore Press Holdings, Wildlife Reserves Singapore, National Library Board and Reading Clubs, when organising programmes. Annual programmes such as the National Schools Xinyao Singing and Songwriting Competition, Wow Wild Learn, World Book Day and Author-in-Residence are wellreceived by students and teachers.
- MLLPC collaborated with People's Association, Malay Activity Executive Committees Council to organise Perkasa Warisan, a programme to inculcate the love for the Malay Language (ML), its culture and heritage. In 2019, teachers from the Arif Budiman Malay Language Teachers' Award workgroup conducted activities such as field trips to Fort Canning Park for students to learn about *ulam*ulaman or salad leaves.
- TLLPC collaborated with the Tamil Language Council and other key Tamil
 institutions to organise the annual Tamil Language Festival, which features a series
 of literary, oratorical and cultural programmes to motivate students to embrace the
 language and use it in their daily lives.

EXAMPLES OF ENHANCEMENTS TO INTIATIVES AND PROGRAMMES

CPCLL	Organising Mini Video Clip Creation Competition
	With the renewed funding, CPCLL will organise video-making workshops for secondary students, where they are encouraged to create short Chinese video clips based on textbook passages, extensive readers, or CL literature. MOE will then explore selecting and improving on some of the content or storylines created by students, for the next series of extensive readers.
MLLPC	Extension of storytelling competition, <i>Ops Baca</i> , to secondary school students The <i>Ops Baca</i> (<i>Reading Operation</i>) is a storytelling competition organised by various Community Club Malay Activity Executive Committees (MAECs) for primary school pupils. Because of the overwhelming response from the primary schools, the MLLPC intends to extend the competition to secondary school students. Students will create their own literary works based on texts from the revised ML secondary curriculum, and present them through Creative and Expressive reading at the competition.

<u>Planning of programmes that introduces TL-related careers to</u> students

The renewed funding will help TLLPC plan programmes to introduce students to TL-related careers, which will complement students' understanding of the usage of TL in Singapore, which is covered in a topic within the revised 2021 Secondary MTL curriculum.

The Committee is also exploring introducing an experiential learning opportunity, where students can be attached to a DJ/Journalist/translator for hands-on learning, after going through a workshop to better understand what the jobs encompass.
