### When will secondary schools be implementing Full SBB?

#### In 2022


Full SBB is being implemented in <u>59</u> secondary schools.

#### **By 2023**

About 90 will be doing so. That's more than 2/3 of our secondary schools!

#### By 2024

The rest of the secondary schools implementing Full SBB will come aboard.



#### What do mixed form classes mean?

When Full SBB is implemented, students will take six Common Curriculum subjects - Art, Character and Citizenship Education, Design and Technology, Food and Consumer Education, Music and Physical Education - together in their mixed form classes.

For other subjects, they will attend lessons with peers taking the subjects at the same subject level.




#### Mix and mingle

This creates more opportunities for students to make friends with schoolmates who have different strengths and interests!

#### Subject levels? What are those?

Under Full SBB, the subject levels General (G)1, G2 and G3 ('G' stands for General) are mapped from today's N(T), N(A) and Express standards respectively.

From 2024, throughout a student's secondary education, he may have the option to take subjects at different subject levels that best suit his strengths, interests, and learning needs.



#### Greater flexibility and ownership

Pilot schools that have implemented Full SBB since 2020 have found that the flexibility has empowered their students to take greater ownership of their learning.

## Looks like my child can customise his learning even more under Full SBB!

Yes! Eligible students can look forward to:

- Offering Humanities at a more demanding level from the start of Sec 2.
- Offering elective subjects, such as Additional Mathematics or Design and Technology, at a more or less demanding level at upper secondary.
- Students previously offering Mother Tongue Language (MTL) 'B' can now offer G1 or G2 MTL in secondary schools.

#### A new common national exam

From 2027, Secondary 4 students will sit for a common national exam and receive the Singapore-Cambridge Secondary Education Certificate (SEC) that reflects the subject level at which they offered each subject. This will replace the current N- and O-Level exams.
